
### **OCTOPUS ORIGAMI**

Like Shimabuku, you too can transform objects and give them a new purpose! Fold this poster using the famous Origami technique to turn it into an octopus. You can keep your octopus to decorate your bedroom!

You just have to follow the numbering and the direction of the folds. In no time at all you will have your own animal! What will you call your octopus?


1. Fold the sheet of paper in half, then in four, then in eight in both directions. Unfold the sheet




2. Fold the top and bottom into the middle

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




- 4. Fold down the corners
- 5. Unfold the central part to the left




6. Fold in the right hand side along line '3', fold down the corners again and fold the central part towards the right



- 7. Pull on the tabs
- 8. Cut the tabs in two, turn over your octopus and then roll up the tabs to give the octopus a rounded shape

# Exhibition Title:


Did you know that you can cut an apple with a computer? That octopuses have favourite shapes and colours?
